"'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future."



Immanuel Lutheran Church, Fargo, invites you to join congregation members for a trip to Kentucky to visit Ark Encounter and Creation Museum.

The motorcoach leaves Bismarck at 8 a.m. on Sunday, April 15, and returns on Saturday, April 21.

Ark Encounter features a full-size Noah's Ark, built according to the dimensions according to the Bible (510 feet long, 85 feet wide and 51 feet high). The Creation Museum features 75,000 square-feet of state-of-the-art exhibits, botanical gardens, a petting zoo and more.

After leaving Kentucky, the group will visit Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Ind., and the Wisconsin



Historical Museum in Madison before returning to Bismarck.

Learn from the 'silent witnesses'

Do you ever wish that you could have been there at Jesus' passion? Imagine what it would be like to:

- ► HEAR the crowds shout "Hosanna!" as Jesus rode into Jerusalem?
- ► SMELL AND TASTE the feast at the Passover?
